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<u>Take a Peek once a week</u>

Within most schools at any one time, there will be a small number of children infected with head lice. Infection levels remain fairly constant, so we need your help to combat the bugs!

How Do I Look for Head Lice?

To diagnose a case of head lice you need to find them alive. This is when you need to use a treatment. They move fast and are small - so they can be hard to find! Head lice range in sizes from a full stop to a sesame seed size.

Where to Peek:

- Close to the scalp
- Behind the ears
- The back of the neck
- The top of the head
- Under the fringe

How Do I Get Rid of Head Lice?

Wet combing method.

The wet combing ('bug-busting') method is physically removing lice using a nit comb, without using chemical treatments. This method can be helpful because head lice are growing increasingly resistant to the insecticides used to remove them.

However, success depends on adopting a painstaking approach of regular and thorough combing, ideally on a weekly basis on both short and long hair.

The best procedure is as follows:

- Wash the hair as normal using an ordinary shampoo.
- Apply conditioner liberally to wet hair (this causes the lice to lose their grip on the hair).

Comb the hair through with a normal comb first, until the comb runs freely.

• Section the hair, then with a fine-toothed nit comb, comb from the roots along the complete length of the hair and after each stroke, check the comb for lice and wipe it clean. Work methodically over the whole head for at least 30 minutes, this can take up to 1 hour or longer (depending on the amount hair your child has)

Rinse the hair as normal.

• Repeat every three days for at least two weeks making sure the pesky bugs are kept at bay.

Some of you may have noticed we have had some new artwork installed near our main entrance if you haven't yet seen our four murals pop along to take a look. We commissioned a local artist called Michael Gill also known as "stripeydogdesign" to work with our Year 6 group from September last year, Michael worked alongside Mrs Duffy and developed pupil's ideas and drawings linked to landscapes local to us. They look fantastic and brighten up the exterior too. Well done Year 6.

Inside Out - Friday 10th Feb

As part of children's mental health week, we will be supporting the If U Care Share Foundation's 'inside out' campaign.

As part of their inside out campaign they are asking teachers, staff, and children across the region to wear an item of clothing inside out (intentionally). What Parents Need to Know about Grand Theft Auto

A free online safety guide on Grand Theft Auto. We are aware that children as young as Reception in school are aware of this game which is most worrying.

Grand Theft Auto is an action-adventure video game series where players control criminals and wreak havoc to complete missions and progress through the game. During the early stages of the game, it solely focused on completing missions to go up a level. However, as the game grew more popular the makers of GTA decided to introduce a narrative to each edition of the game. The aim of this was to increase user engagement, making gamers believe that they were not just playing as the character, but they became the character. Grand Theft Auto is accessible on several devices including PlayStation and Xbox, desktop computers, PSP, Nintendo DS, and Mobile.

In the guide below, you'll find tips on several potential risks such as violent content, profane language and playing with strangers.

Due to the nature of the game and the age restrictions, GTA includes content that is inappropriate for anyone under the age of 18, including sex, nudity, violence, profane language, and substance abuse. These are the main components that make up the game -you have to do certain things and witness certain things in order to move on in the game. Exposing your child to this type of content could affect their morals and understanding of right and wrong. Additionally, your child could become desensitised to similar situations, reinforcing the fact they they would find it hard to differentiate between right/wrong and good/bad.
